Course description:

The course aims to train the students to develop their speaking and listening skills, such as differentiating general information from needed details while listening, using stress and intonation correctly, etc. It also provides them with strategies, such as prioritizing or ranking ideas, and restating for clarity, to improve communication skills. The training will take place within the class and in laboratory using audio materials to train the students to listen to language used in different situations to produce language that approximates intelligible verities of English. Listening and Speaking I is a pre-requisite course for this course.
